Description
Provide a short description of the event and its activities.

The TRACER International Seminar “Leaving a trace: Roma and non-Roma young people between memory and present” aimed to disseminate the project's results both in terms of visible or material results (bibliographical research, murals, paintings, videos, graffiti, interviews, book), and in terms of invisible (or immaterial) results, such as the training that resulted from the entire process of participatory action-research.

Throughout the day, in its various moments and panels, young Roma and non-Roma were able to highlight their work and the effects of the project on them as people and future professionals. Considering that for these young people this was their first opportunity to speak in public, expressing their interests and their journey in the project, the seminar also helped to contribute to their participation and empowerment, two fundamental objectives of the TRACER project.

Shared knowledge between Roma and non-Roma and joint learning were recognized as fundamental in this process of participatory action research.

The seminar also contributed to the deconstruction of stereotypes in a wider audience by bringing young Roma graduates and book authors to the "stage". An important aspect was having Roma young people narrating their first hand experiences with discrimination and poverty, and how learning about their past and their history, and sharing them with others, was critical to an enhanced feeling of empowerment and cultural identity.

The network of relationships created between young Roma from the different countries involved and the knowledge of different realities were highlighted during the seminar and recognized as a fundamental asset of the TRACER project.

The Seminar had a large and diverse audience and the participation of Portuguese government figures such as the Director of the Department for Equality and Combating Racism, Xenophobia and Discrimination at AIMA, Portugal and specialists and students of different nationalities.

Which History? Holocaust/Porrajmos


Several reasons for this choice:

- The Holocaust is still an event that is difficult to understand.
- It was not the result of a momentary madness, but was conceived within a rational modern society. That is why it is a problem of this society and this culture (Bauman 1992)
- Dealing with the subject of the Holocaust means reasoning about the way institutions and members of contemporary society act, in which 'evil', according to Arendt (1991), takes the ordinary form of everyday life.
- The Holocaust was a way to rationalise racism and define those who are 'different' as pathological, dangerous and worthy of elimination. In this idea of the 'different' as being 'pathological', is the history of the Roma and Sinti people, who have always embodied the symbol of diversity and for this reason have been subject to a process of stigmatisation. The Roma and Sinti people suffered discrimination long before the Nazi persecutions of the last century.
- The history of the Second World War, with the Holocaust, can provide an explanation of the current discrimination against the Roma and Sinti people.
- Remember the genocide is an imperative commitment in a society immersed in the present. Direct witnesses of what happened in the concentration camps are inevitably few and part of public opinion regards the Holocaust as a distant event, with few references to current events and casting no shadows on the future.

TRACER : AN ACTION-RESEARCH, A PROCESS

Promote → bring out knowledge

Activate → project, plan and change



ACTION RESEARCH

One fundamental principle of action-research is the promotion of **autonomy and empowerment among social actors and the collaborative construction of knowledge.**

In Tracer the main actors are **Roma and non-Roma youth and adolescents** from Italy, Portugal and Poland, in a process of co-construction of knowledge and change.

The target of the project is also subject of the research. Knowledge is produced collectively by youth and adolescents (Roma and not Roma), deconstructing the role of "specialist" normally assigned to scientist, and from this group it is shared with others. In this case this is achieved through a structured process involving **investigation, action, reflexivity, and (trans)formation.**

THE PROJECT AIMS TO:


- mobilize groups of Roma and not Roma adolescents/young adults** (male and female) to collect narratives in Italy, Portugal and Poland about the Holocaust and Roma genocide.
- Reconstructing and documenting the history of the Holocaust** through search in online national and international libraries and with interviews with significant witnesses from the Roma and non-Roma community and visiting significant Holocaust memorial sites.
- Making young people (Roma and not Roma), aware of a history that links the Roma communities to Europe** and re-evaluating Roma membership in the EU.
- Activating teenagers** (Roma and not Roma) to be trainers/informers through the construction of an artistic event on genocide aimed at a wide audience (graffiti, music, theatre, film/documentary, etc.) and increasing young people's awareness of peace and universal human rights.
- Producing knowledge through training and educational workshops on genocide in schools** with Roma preadolescents, students and multi-ethnic classes.
- Promoting reflection on the construction of prejudice and discrimination**

The construction of knowledge is not neutral but political, based on its values.

The trip to Auschwitz was a central event of the project, significant from many perspectives: it was their **first flight** for someone they met a **group of peers**, both Sinti and non-Sinti, who return to **share the experience** and they were able to give historical importance to their family and community history, realising that **Sinti history** and culture are recognized internationally.

OUTREACH IN SCHOOLS

The phase of the project was developed in Bologna, where for years we have been collaborating with schools on projects aimed at Rom and Sinti students.

The training provided for teachers allowed them to discuss the **historical topic and how to present it to the class**. The teachers had some concerns because the students in the third grade had not yet studied World War II. However, we observed that these historical gaps were addressed through **cooperative methodologies**, the use of **varied inputs**, and the emotional and organisational **engagement** of the students.



It was a **multidisciplinary project** that included artistic work: the translation from German of the comic "The local Jew" by Otto Rosenberg, and a small concert with the music class.

What motivated the students was precisely **taking care of the success of the event**, considering the type of impression they wanted to convey to their peers, and having the **space for their creativity**.

Chi rom e chi no (extract of the speech)

Knowing the history. What was the genocide of Roma and Sinti?

For the group from Naples, the Tracer project was a long dive into uncharted waters.

The girls and boys who formed the leading group followed us with confidence and curiosity into a historical adventure that, until then, they knew nothing about and that had affected them only indirectly. We had to devise a long and comprehensible artistic, cultural, and pedagogical path to approach and explore it.

Second generation Roma migrants from the countries of former Yugoslavia, in particular Serbia, Macedonia, Bosnia, and Croatia, some of them already the parents of a third generation of very young children, candidly brought their experience of living in the informal camps of the metropolitan area, from Scampia to Giugliano in Campania, with all that this experience entails.

They – the grandchildren of people who had to flee the war in the Balkans – preserve in their memories and in their family stories the experience of ethnic cleansing and the trauma of the erasure of entire villages, archives, and registry offices. This is still reflected today in the complicated process of obtaining identity papers, despite the fact that they and their children were born in Italy.

The story of the Holocaust and the Porrajmos/Samudaripen began as a macabre tale unfolding in a hazy past. The contours were gradually defined through the use of audiovisual materials, the collection of direct testimonies from members of Roma and Sinti communities in other regions of Italy, and finally the trip to Auschwitz, which materialised the painful words, the unspeakable suffering, the stories of broken communities and of lives bludgeoned to death by an atrocious institutional design. Today they are finally and painstakingly being brought to light.
